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Editorial

The Institute of Social Research and Applied Anthropology publishes the Journal named "Man and Culture." This institute serves as a hub for educating social scientists on the ideas and methods for the advancement of marginal communities like Adibasi and Horizons, as well as those who are illiterate, unskilled, and financially impoverished. There are disparities in the technical, economic, educational, and cultural levels of development among Bangladesh's Adibasi community. Regardless of their employment, the majority of Adibasi live below the poverty level. Inadequate food in terms of both amount and quality, ignorance, illiteracy, immobility, poor living circumstances, illness, early mortality, and similar factors can all be considered aspects of poverty.

Anthropologists' recommended approach to Adibasi development calls for a thorough understanding of the social structure and cultural values through in-depth field research and the gathering of sufficient and comprehensive data prior to the planning and formulation of any development policy for any group of people. As a result, an anthropologist sees Adibasi development as a movement that focuses on strengthening organisational structures, a program that emphasises activities, a method that emphasises certain attainable ends, a process that emphasises what happens to people not only economically and socially but also psychologically, and the institutionalisation of newly discovered skills and procedures that lead to social change without entirely departing from the past.

This publication serves as a forum for the examination of "fundamental issues" related to Adibasi development. Planning at the micro level will thus result in the identification of priorities for these individuals' development.
